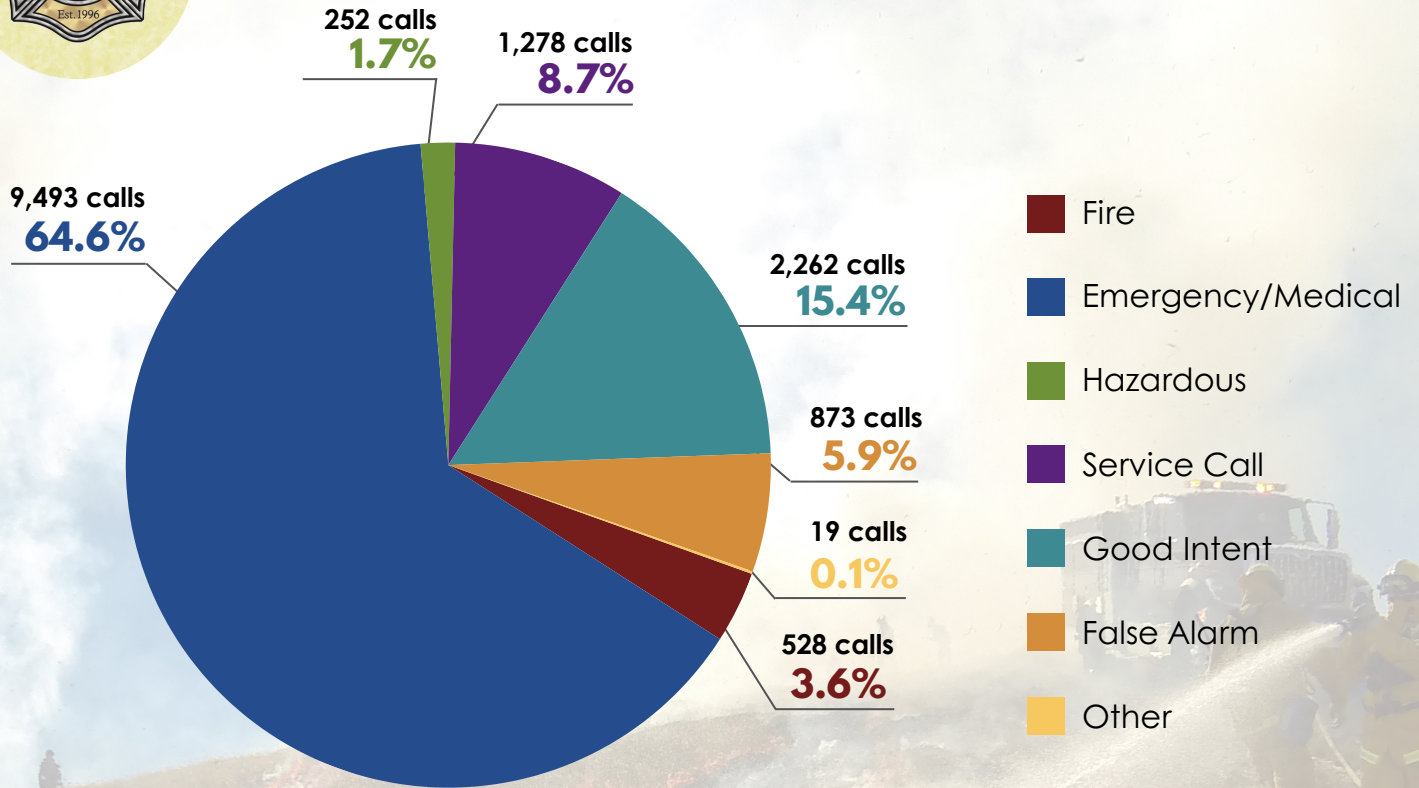

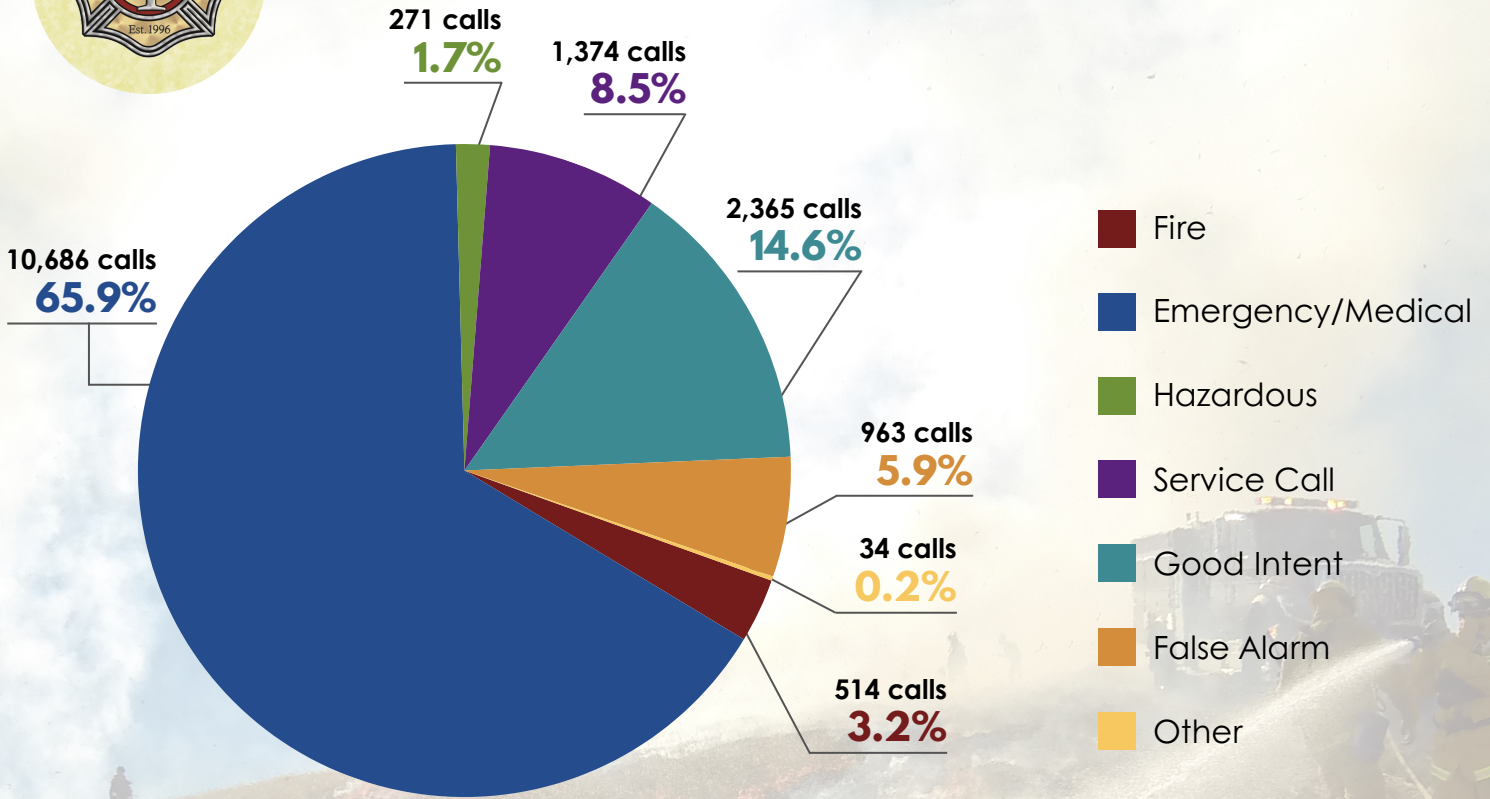

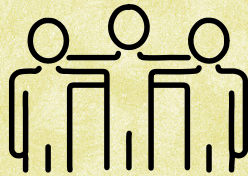
LOOKING FORWARD

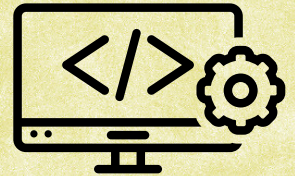
